Tammy Kimbrough brings more than ten years of senior human resources experience to HSSU. She has worked in a variety of industries including international manufacturing, long-term health care and social service. Prior to joining Harris-Stowe, Kimbrough served as the compliance officer for a local not-for-profit.
