The Upward Bound summer program consisted of an exciting six-week session filled with college preparatory classes, field trips and fun.

For the first time this summer, the students took a Mandarin Chinese class in an effort to expand their horizons and experience a new language/culture. They also took English/ACT Prep, History, Laboratory Science, Mathematics and College/Career Counseling classes.

While classes were in session, the rising 11th and 12th graders had an opportunity to stay in the Gillespie Residence Hall on the Harris-Stowe campus. Those students were also offered work-study jobs on campus or in the community in order to build their job skills and expose them to various careers available to college graduates.

The entire student group took educational/cultural field trips to the America I Am exhibit at the Missouri History Museum, the Holocaust Museum to hear directly from a survivor and to Forest Park for a fun day of visiting with the other two Upward Bound programs in St. Louis. The students ended the summer with the annual Culminating Activity filled with poetry reciting, dance, song and student-written theatre. NEW ORLEANS EDUCATIONAL/CULTURAL FIELD TRIP

From July 17-22, Upward Bound took 40 students on an action-packed trip to New Orleans, Louisiana. The group visited three colleges: Xavier University, Dillard University and Southern University at New Orleans. They walked the French Quarter and learned all about the city's rich history. They also toured the entire city of New Orleans by bus and saw first hand the devastation and rebuilding efforts six years after Hurricane Katrina hit. They visited Mardi Gras World and learned about the religious and cultural connections of the famous celebration. At the Laura Plantation the students got to see what life as a slave was really like as they walked through the original slave cabins and saw the sugar cane fields that were maintained by slave labor. Following the plantation, the group went on a swamp tour where they saw alligators in the wild and learned about nature on the bayou. On the last day, the group enjoyed a relaxing ride on the Mississippi River on the Natchez steamboat. It was a trip that will be remembered by all!


