Fuller named Advisor to the President to continue HSSU's sports program enhancements

ST. LOUIS, MO (May 15, 2015) – Harris-Stowe State University (HSSU) is pleased to announce Tim Fuller has joined its Athletic department to advise the President on sports-related matters. Fuller, who was most recently the associate head coach at the University of Missouri-Columbia, will work closely with Jamaal Mayo, the university's new Director of Athletics. Mayo was previously the assistant athletic director for development at Western Carolina University (WCU) in Cullowhee, N.C.

Fuller, who was chosen by ESPN.com as one of the top 10 assistant coaches under the age of 40 in May 2012, has previously worked on basketball staffs at Elon College, Miami, Fla., Wake Forest, Fairfield and Louisville before coming to Missouri. During the 2013-14 season when Fuller filled in as interim coach, he led the Missouri Tigers to a 5-0 start. He is a native of Woodbridge, Va., and former player at Wake Forest.

Fuller has an extensive background in marketing, athletics, and player development. Throughout his professional career he has mentored and advised NBA All Stars, such as Chris Paul, Josh Howard, Rajon Rondo, Jeff Teague, Steph Curry, Andre Igoudala. He is most proud of his role as a dedicated father, which he spends his summers with Timothy II, Gabriel Elijah and Solomon Dior.
